



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Teaching Notes:

Hi Amara,

We do a cross-curricular Dust Bowl program with students who come to our museum and you are welcome to use any of our *add-ons*!

One thing we've found that really brings the images home for the kids is Woody Guthrie's song "Dust Bowl Blues" ("Talking Dust Bowl Blues" is another good one). You can play the audio, but even if we don't have playing, the lyrics paint a picture of what people experienced. https://www.woodyguthrie.org/Lyrics/Dust_Bowl_Blues.htm We have the kids listen to the song and follow along with a lyric sheet (several will start singing or humming along). Then, using a blank map of the US, they have to shade in the Dust Bowl states mentioned in the song and the primary source photos. They then trace the route to California of the Okies.

The final piece of the activity are Dust Bowl erosion boxes. We made them from plastic shoe boxes and a toilet paper tube. There is a hole cut in one of the short box ends and the tube is hot melt glued into the hole, with about 1 inch inside the box and the remainder outside. The boxes have a 1/2 inch layer of sand in them. We use a Shop-Vac on reverse to blow air into the box to show what the Dust Bowl was like. Then we give the kids rocks, fake grass, fake trees, and sticks to come up with a CCC plan to stop the Dust Bowl. Once they've created a hypothesis and then built their erosion control, we come around with the Shop-Vac again and test their design. Little green army men make it more fun! They get 3 chances to stop the Dust before we stop and discuss what went right and what went wrong in their designs and for the CCC!
